



**MINUTES**  
**LIQUOR COMMISSION - REGULAR SESSION**  
**TUESDAY, APRIL 8, 2025, 4:00 PM**

The Liquor Commission convened in regular session at 4:00p.m. in the Government Center 2<sup>nd</sup> floor conference room. Commissioner Mwilambwe called the meeting to order.

**Public Comment**

Quinlan Tisdale emailed public comment. Meghan Reha, Fleetwood Jackson, and Angela Shine all registered to provide in person public comment, but when called opted to speak at the Public Hearing for Item 5.A.

**Consent Agenda**

No Consent Agenda Items were presented.

**Regular Agenda**

*All license creations, amendments, or transfers are contingent upon compliance with all building, health, and safety codes.*

*The following item was presented:*

Item 5.A. Continued Public Hearing and Action on an Application from MGN Foods, Inc., d/b/a West Market Groceries, located at 301 W. Market St., Requesting Approval of a Change in Classification from a Class PBS (Package, Beer & Wine Only, and Sunday Sales) to a Class PAS (Package, All Types of Alcohol, and Sunday Sales) Liquor License.

Commissioner Mwilambwe opened the Public Hearing at 4:08 p.m.

Mahesh Patel, President and Owner of West Market Groceries, Inc., and Victor Patel, Manager of West Market Groceries, Inc., after being sworn, addressed the Commission. Mr. Victor Patel noted that they applied for the increase in classification application based on a petition of over 200 signatures, which they had included as an attachment to their submitted application.

Leslie Yocum, City Clerk, reminded speakers to speak their name before each turn so the record would be clear.

Asst. Corporation Counsel George Boyle asked for confirmation that a petition was submitted. Mr. Victor Patel confirmed.

Mr. Mahesh Patel explained that they had been doing business in the location since 2012 and noted that they had built the business up from the previous owner and cleaned everything up. He stated that when the previous owner decided to sell, they bought the business and the dry cleaner business next door. He noted that they owned Fast Stop in the Town of Normal and that he owned and ran Franzetti's Pantry Plus for 22 years, but sold the business and now only owned the property.

Mr. Boyle noted that there would be two Exhibits added to the Item. He stated Exhibit A would be calls for service, and Exhibit B would be the heat map.

Commissioner Mwilambwe asked Asst. Police Chief Paul Williams to provide a report of additional information found since the last meeting.

Asst. Chief Williams presented a detailed breakdown of calls for service from the fire and police departments within a three-block radius of the applicant's property. He explained that the heat map showed the locations of these calls, with red areas indicating more frequent service calls. He noted that most calls occurred in the evening hours, typically between 4 p.m. and midnight. He clarified that not all calls were alcohol-related, but many could be connected to alcohol or drug use. He highlighted that the area around 301 West Market Street had a similar number of calls to other locations in the city and pointed out that the calls included a wide variety of services, from medical emergencies to mental health interventions, and not all were necessarily serious or criminal in nature. He emphasized that the data showed the location was not an exceptional hotspot for service calls compared to other areas in Bloomington.

Commissioner Mwilambwe noted there were liquor violations listed on page four of Exhibit A. Asst. Chief Williams explained that a liquor violation for this area was minimal compared to the amount seen for bars in the Downtown Bloomington area.

Commissioner Mwilambwe asked about calls for alcohol-related incidents. Asst. Chief Williams explained that while many calls might have appeared alcohol-related, such as heat exposure, unconsciousness, or mental health issues, not all were directly tied to alcohol consumption. He noted that the calls are spread across different areas, with many concentrated in the downtown bar district, particularly between 11 p.m. and 2 a.m. He highlighted the area's unique characteristics and mentioned the mix of businesses, apartments, and foot traffic. He pointed out that nearby locations, such as Phoenix Towers, generated more service calls.

Commissioner Mwilambwe asked if the applicants had any questions for Asst. Police Chief Williams. Mr. Patel did not ask a question but noted that Pub I, which was less than two blocks away from their establishment, was approved for both on and off-premises consumption of all types of alcohol in the last couple of years.

Commissioner Mwilambwe asked if there was anyone in the audience present to question Asst. Chief Williams about the Exhibits presented and noted that comments or discussions had at the previous Public Hearing should not be repeated as they were on the record already.

Rebecca Welch, after being sworn, addressed Asst. Chief Williams. Ms. Welch asked a question about the heat map, specifically inquiring whether the calls shown were generated at the specific site or if they were calls about crimes in the surrounding area. She noted that many calls might be generated by neighbors reporting issues, even if they didn't occur directly at a

specific location. Asst. Chief Williams clarified that the map represented the destination of service calls, not necessarily their origin. He explained that if someone called about an incident from one location, but the police or emergency services responded at a different location, the map would show the destination of the response.

Ms. Welch noted another business close by that was not on the map, and Asst. Chief Williams stated that the report was run for calls within a three-block radius of the applicant's property. Ms. Welch confirmed that she originally asked where the calls were generated from. Asst. Chief Williams explained that the heat map represented the destination of service calls, not their origin, and provided an example where someone might call from one location, like the top of a parking deck, but the police or emergency services would respond at a different location, such as Phoenix Towers. He noted the map would show where the emergency services went rather than where the initial call was made.

Commissioner Mwilambwe asked if the location the services were sent to or the location the call originated from was more important. Asst. Chief Williams stated that the location they responded to would be more important for the purpose of the current discussion.

Ms. Welch asked the applicants whether the current cleaners and laundromat spaces would be maintained if they expanded to sell liquor and asked if they planned to expand their space to sell liquor. Mr. Patel responded that they included plans in their application of how the space would be used.

Ms. Welch asked about the nearby parking garage and bus station on Market Street and expressed concerns about potential security issues related to the new liquor license. She questioned how the City would prevent people from different cities who purchased alcohol and then consumed it in or around the laundromat and cleaners. Commissioner Mwilambwe noted that Connect Transit would have security at the bus station. Ms. Welch expressed concern about how there would be no security around the perimeter.

Mr. Boyle asked the applicants to confirm that the premises itself would not be expanding, only the variety of alcohol offered. Mr. Patel confirmed and noted that the interior of the store layout would change to accommodate the addition of new items.

Commissioner Mwilambwe asked if there was anyone else in the audience present to question Asst. Chief Williams about the Exhibits presented.

Fleetwood Raymond Jackson, after being sworn, addressed the Asst. Chief Williams. Mr. Jackson asked if 301 Market St. would be considered a hot spot on Exhibit B. Asst. Chief Williams clarified that the red dots on the heat map indicated a higher number of service calls but not necessarily more serious incidents. He explained that the calls could range from minor issues like someone locking their keys in a car to helping someone who has fallen. He emphasized that the red color represented numerical frequency, not the severity of the incidents, and that the area in question was not as active as other areas.

Mr. Jackson asked if there were a lot of reports of incidents at the applicant's property related to alcohol consumption. Asst. Chief Williams explained that the term "a lot" is relative when discussing service calls. He clarified that drinking itself is not illegal, and police would typically be called due to specific incidents where alcohol may have been a factor. He noted that they might not have known if the alcohol was purchased from the specific establishment or from elsewhere and emphasized that the data set presented showed the volume of calls in the area, not a detailed breakdown of alcohol-related incidents.

Commissioner Mwilambwe asked what the number of incidents was for a crowded area shown in Exhibit B. Asst. Chief Williams explained that the current data set requested covered a three-and-a-half-year period and noted that the calls to this location were about average and not significantly more or less than other locations. He emphasized that, based on the heat map, the business was not currently one of the top locations for police or fire service calls.

Marty Lane, after being sworn, addressed Asst. Chief Williams. Ms. Lane noted that Pub I had been at the same location and could sell packaged alcohol for a very long time, so they had not had any changes related to alcohol in the past few years. She recounted the historical challenges of the neighborhood, referenced past issues, and mentioned other problematic establishments with hard liquor. She described how the community worked with law enforcement and cleaned up the blocks, and how the residents in the neighborhood had worked together to prevent new hard liquor establishments from being opened in the neighborhood. She highlighted that the area past Lee Street had historically been more difficult to control and noted the presence of large apartment buildings and other challenges. Asst. Chief Williams noted that the area she mentioned was more difficult because there was a higher population.

Ms. Lane discussed the neighborhood's transformation and highlighted changes in the area from Lee Street to Roosevelt. She noted the reduction of buildings and how Market Street had been quieter. She pointed out significant changes in the neighborhood over the past five years, which included the evolution of Phoenix Towers, new buildings on West Market Street, and the addition of several social service facilities. She mentioned that the parking garage attracted many ambulatory and transient individuals and emphasized how dramatically the community's landscape and demographics had shifted in a relatively short time.

Mrs. Yocum reminded the speaker that questions would have to be asked in the current Public Hearing format.

Ms. Lane asked Asst. Chief Williams to confirm whether the volume of alcohol-related calls was unique to the area and asked if such a concentration of service calls existed anywhere else in Bloomington. Asst. Chief Williams noted that other areas could be just as problematic but confirmed that the area in question was hot. Ms. Lane asked how many establishments there were in the area that allowed access to liquor. She noted the presence of ambulatory, impoverished, and unhoused individuals with mental health issues in the neighborhood and argued that the high number of liquor access points, combined with the vulnerable population, created a dangerous situation.

Asst. Chief Williams acknowledged the unique characteristics of the area and noted its mix of businesses, busy streets, older buildings converted to apartments, and proximity to downtown. He explained that Bloomington had few areas comparable to the neighborhood in terms of its urban landscape and foot traffic, and agreed that the area would have relatively high access to both alcohol and drugs compared to other parts of the City.

Lynn Foster, after being sworn, addressed the Asst. Chief Williams. Ms. Foster asked what benefit to the community the change would make if approved.

Commissioner Mwilambwe clarified the intent of the question and cautioned against Asst. Chief Williams being placed in a position to defend the potential benefits of a new liquor license. He suggested that Ms. Foster focus on the potential negative consequences of adding more liquor to the area, based on Asst. Chief Williams' professional observations. He emphasized that Asst. Chief Williams was present to provide factual testimony about service calls and incidents, not to advocate for or against the license application.

Asst. Chief Williams addressed the potential impact of adding another liquor license to the area. He explained that from a law enforcement perspective, he predicted that the new license would likely increase calls for service and draw more people to the area. He noted that he could not provide an exact number but emphasized that alcohol and individuals facing challenging life circumstances were not a good combination and suggested that from a professional standpoint, the introduction of more alcohol access could potentially exacerbate existing community issues.

Angela Shine, after being sworn, addressed the Asst. Chief Williams. Ms. Shine asked what the number of calls related to mental health were relative to all other calls for the applicant property and if the Police Department had seen a decrease in the last two years. Asst. Chief Williams explained that the business location received more mental health-related calls compared to other places but noted that the business served as a refuge for people seeking shelter, particularly from cold weather. He highlighted that the business was open to the public and maintained a welcoming, non-hostile environment, which made it attractive to people seeking a safe space, and he stated that the accessibility contributed to the higher number of mental health-related service calls to the location. He suggested that mental health-related calls to the location had likely remained stable or potentially decreased slightly over time and noted that some individuals who previously caused frequent service calls had received help and found alternative resources. He indicated that while he couldn't provide an exact figure, his professional assessment was that the calls had not increased and may have even diminished somewhat.

Ms. Welch, who was sworn previously, explained that the lack of blue dots around 301 West Market Street was due to the absence of residential spaces in the area. She pointed out that the location was near a fenced-off community garden and a vacant field, with no homes nearby. She noted that the area around Center Street was heavily trafficked, but with no residential structures, there were fewer opportunities for service calls. She suggested that the clean appearance of the map was primarily a result of the physical characteristics of the location rather than an indication of low activity or safety.

Commissioner Mwilambwe asked if there was anyone in the audience who would like to speak for or against the item and reminded the speakers to avoid duplication of comments if they spoke previously.

Meghan Rhea, after being sworn, addressed the Commission. Ms. Rhea referenced a quote from sociologist Kenneth Kolb's book, *Retail Inequality*, which reads, "The distribution of retail in America is not random. Neighborhoods that lack high-quality retail today were decimated by the urban decline that occurred after WWII, bulldozed by the urban-renewal programs of the 1960s, and abandoned during the white flight to the suburbs in the 1970s. The communities that were left behind suffered through generations of concentrated and racially segregated poverty. Today, they lack the population density and collective buying power to support small-scale retail that provides wholesome goods and services. Instead, the only retail that is economically viable must offset the lower overall volume of sales with high profit margins per item. Unfortunately, the highest margin items too often cater to vice (alcohol and tobacco) or exploit the poor (payday lenders and pawn shops). I call these options "bad retail." Ms. Rhea stated that Kolb's description accurately reflected the long-standing cycle of business development in West Bloomington. She noted that through various city initiatives like community development block grants and city planning, there was a clear community intention to move away from this pattern. She emphasized that the broader city did not want to continue the historical trend of limited, exploitative retail options in the neighborhood and instead sought to invest in and improve the area's economic landscape. She highlighted recent City branding efforts that positioned West

Market Street as the gateway to Bloomington, particularly for travelers who entered via the I-74 corridor, and argued that if a liquor license were granted at 301 West Market Street, it would undermine those aspirations. She contended that such a license represented "bad retail" and contradicted the City's vision of showcasing the neighborhood's beauty, walkability, and potential for downtown and near-downtown development. She discussed the long-standing community desire for a genuine grocery store in West Bloomington and emphasized the need for wholesome retail. She asked about the standards for using the word "grocery" in a business title, particularly for a packaged liquor store, and whether there were any requirements regarding the sale of refrigerated items or minimum standards for what constituted a grocery establishment.

Commissioner Mwilambwe noted that a business could use any name it wanted to. Mr. Boyle and Mrs. Yocum explained that the City Code did provide requirements for the amount of space an establishment was permitted to dedicate to alcohol. Mrs. Yocum noted that no concerns were raised during the application review related to the percentage of floor space used for alcohol. Ms. Reha confirmed that, based on the code definition, the applicant met the requirements to be listed as a grocery convenience store. Mrs. Yocum answered yes.

Ms. Reha shared her perspective as a West Bloomington resident who frequently walked to the downtown area. She expressed concern about the potential impact of adding hard liquor to the location regarding traffic safety and noted that with the area's fast-turning vehicles and pedestrian traffic, an increase in liquor sales could lead to more intoxicated driving and potentially increased traffic fatalities. She emphasized her desire for a pleasant walking experience and argued that granting a liquor license would detract from the neighborhood's quality and safety.

Leroyce Lane, after being sworn, addressed the Commission. Mr. Lane noted he had been a West Market Street resident since 1998. He shared his personal experience of neighborhood transformation and described the area's past challenges with intoxicated individuals, prostitution, gang members, and drug activity. He stated that over 27 years, he and his neighbors worked hard to improve the community, and they felt comfortable sitting on their porches and allowing their grandchildren to play outside. He acknowledged the existing pub across the street and noted that while it had incidents, the owners and bartenders had demonstrated responsible practices, which prevented excessive intoxication. He highlighted the presence of social service organizations and described the current neighborhood conditions, which included abandoned properties and vulnerable individuals. He emphasized the community's efforts to revitalize the Market Street corridor, which served as the first impression for visitors, and argued that another liquor store would undermine years of community work to improve the area. He challenged the business owners' claims about their parking lot and stated that from his front porch, he could observe drinking and fighting, which were often handled through personal community intervention rather than official channels. He stressed that the addition of another liquor outlet would be counterproductive to the community's long-standing efforts to clean up and improve the neighborhood.

Ms. Lane, who was sworn previously, highlighted the City's improved approach to mental health services and praised the Bloomington Police for their effective utilization of the new resources. She suggested this had likely reduced the number of mental health-related incidents in the area. She described how City engineers removed the staircase in front of her home and the stairs in front of the pub because of safety concerns related to intoxicated pedestrians. She explained that due to the removal of stairs, there were no accessible staircases on Market Street and noted that the five-step staircase she paid \$3,000 for was eliminated, which created significant challenges for residents.

Commissioner Mwilambwe asked if the applicants had any comments. Mr. Victor Patel responded to the previous testimony about homeless individuals and alcohol consumption and argued that most people drank responsibly and occasionally. He acknowledged that the applicants cannot control others' behavior and emphasized that their store served between 150-200 customers daily, with fewer than one homeless person typically purchasing beer. He described their business as a comprehensive neighborhood store that offered a wide range of packaged goods, which included meals, bread, cheese, meat, and sandwiches. He argued that they were seeking a fair opportunity, similar to other surrounding businesses, by requesting a liquor license.

Mr. Mahesh Patel shared his background as an engineer from Detroit who transitioned to entrepreneurship. He explained that he came to the community, started businesses in Normal and Bloomington, and had been in the area since 1999. He emphasized his commitment to the community, noted that he owned stores in West Market and Normal, and planned to expand further. He stressed that his intention was not to create problems, but to serve the community.

Commissioner Mwilambwe stated that the Commission would take the information and testimony in advisement and would provide a determination in seven to ten days, and that the information would be provided to the applicants, staff, and other interested parties who provided contact information.

Commissioner Mwilambwe closed the Public Hearing at 5:20 p.m.

*The following item was presented:*

Item 5.B. Continued Appearance on a Citation Issued to Taqueria Porton Inc., d/b/a Taqueria Porton, located at 901 N. Main St., for Violating Chapter 6, Section 37(e)(12) of the Bloomington City Code Relating to Failure to Pay City of Bloomington Food and Beverage Taxes.

Asst. Corporation Counsel George Boyle explained that the business was initially cited for failure to pay taxes and had since paid all taxes and penalties. He mentioned that an Agreed Order had been prepared for the business to sign, and a settlement amount would be paid. He stated that once the \$600 settlement was paid, which was due by the end of the month, he would send the Agreed Order to Commissioner Mwilambwe for final signature, and noted that if the payment fell through, the matter would proceed to sanctions. He stated that at present, the establishment had communicated effectively, paid all outstanding amounts, and the process was now primarily about finalizing paperwork.

*The following item was presented:*

Item 5.C. Continued Sanctions Review on a Citation Issued to Grand Café, LLC d/b/a Grand Café, located at 2205 E. Oakland Ave., Suite A2, for Violating Chapter 6, Section 37(e)(12) of the Bloomington City Code Relating to Failure to Pay Food and Beverage Tax.

Asst. Corporation Counsel Boyle discussed the sanctions hearing for Grand Café, LLC, regarding unpaid taxes. He noted that there was currently a tax agreement in effect and that all taxes, penalties, and fees had been paid. He mentioned that an Agreed Order had been prepared for the business to sign, and a \$800 settlement was due by the end of the month. He noted that the fine for the item was higher because it was the establishment's second offense.

Asst. Corporation Counsel Boyle discussed sanctions against TVEO Corporation for selling alcohol to a minor during a compliance check in December 2024. He explained that the establishment was initially fined \$1,500 and had its license suspended for one day on February 1, 2025. He noted that since they made sales during the suspended period, additional sanctions were agreed upon, which included a two-day suspension on Friday, March 14, 2025, and Saturday, March 15, 2025, as well as a fine of \$1,400 to be paid in two installments. He stated they would be required to pay \$700 by March 31, 2025, and the remaining \$700 would be required to be paid by the next hearing on April 8, 2025.

*The following item was presented:*

Item 5.D. Continued Review of Sanctions Imposed on TVEO Corporation, d/b/a Eric's Too, located at 921 Maple Hill Rd., for Sale of Alcohol when License was Suspended.

Asst. Corporation Counsel Boyle discussed sanctions against TVEO Corporation for selling alcohol to a minor during a compliance check in December 2024, which marked the fifth such failure in three years. He explained that the establishment was initially fined \$1,500 and had its license suspended for one day on February 1, 2025. He noted that since they made sales during the suspended period, additional sanctions were agreed upon, which included a two-day suspension on Friday, March 14, 2025, and Saturday, March 15, 2025, as well as a fine of \$1,400 to be paid in two installments. He reported that the suspension was carried out on the weekend of March 14-15 and noted that no sales occurred during that time. He stated that the business had paid the fine in full and declared the matter resolved.

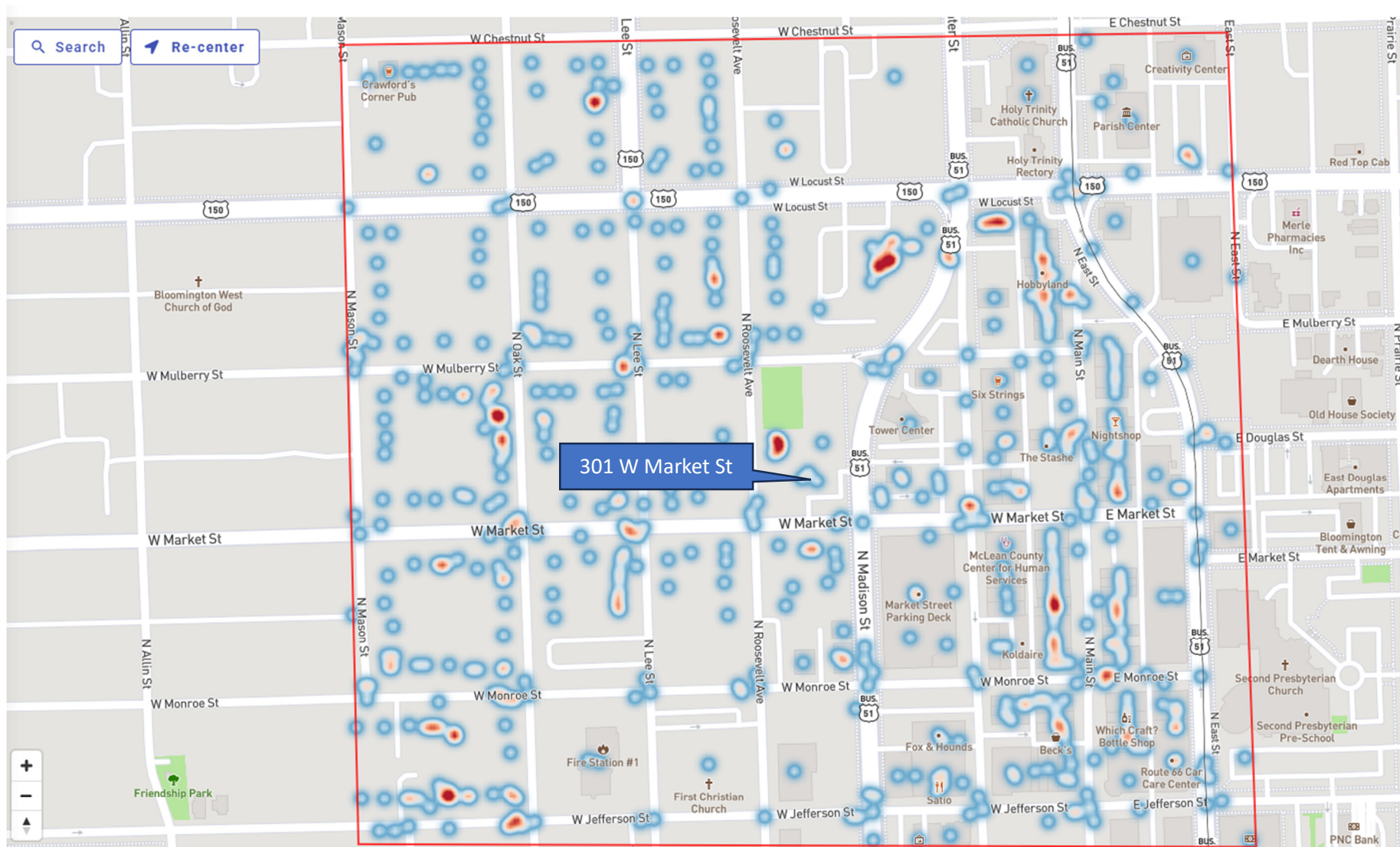
